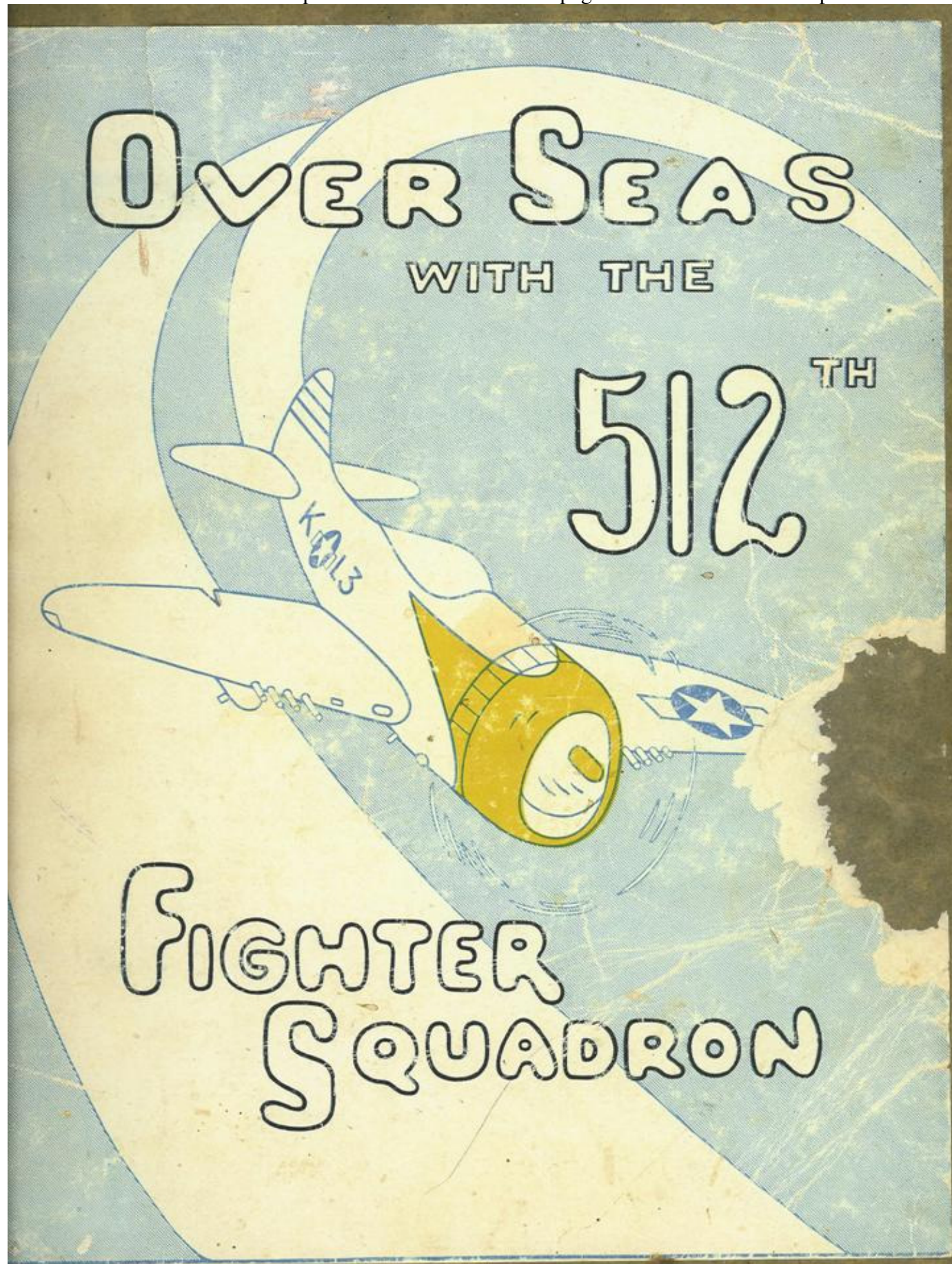

## FOREWORD

**May 8, 1944 - May 8, 1945**

**(Combat Operational Period)**

The activities of the 512th Fighter Squadron since becoming operational in the ETO may be classified as outstanding. Assigned to the XIX TAC upon arrival in the UK and stationed near Ashford, Kent, in England, the organization took part in the pre-invasion air offensive. During this period, Major Locke and his crew flew all types of missions from the escort of heavy bombers to dive bombing. Due to the fine work of all personnel on these long days, the Squadron was able to accumulate a great deal of combat time in this comparatively short period.

On the day of the invasion, the 512th was one of the first squadrons over the beach-head and up to the day when the organization was moved to the continent as many as six missions were flown in one day. This was the Normandy campaign and it can truthfully be said that during this time from June 6th to July 25th the Basher Squadron did a splendid job.

July 25th, the date of the St. Lo breakthrough and General Patton's dash through France, marked another phase of operations. Divided into three echelons all moves of the Squadron were carried out without a letup in operations. Bayeux was the first base that the planes took off from in the Normandy area. Next stop was at Cretteville on August 17th. All this time and up until the 6th of February 1945, the yellow nose ships of the 512th flew in support of General Patton's third army. In order to keep within striking distance of the enemy, three more long moves had to be made during this time. The first found the organization near Le Mans, the second was at Mourmelon-le-Grand near Rheims where four months were spent. It was at this time that the Nazis tried to make a breakthrough in the Ardennes sector but magnificent fighting like that of the 101st Airborne Division, with the superb cooperation of the 512th Fighter Squadron made history at Bastogne, Belgium. The next move was to Metz for a short stay.

While operating from Loupelande, near Le Mans, the 512th took part in the destruction of German columns south of the Loire River, which earned the Presidential Citation for the organization. On the day that this book went to press, a cluster to the Presidential Citation was awarded the Group for its superior work at Bastogne during the breakthrough in the Ardennes.

It was on February 6th that the 406th Fighter Group was transferred to the XXIX TAC and moved to a new base near Asch, Belgium. Taking part in the final major offensive against the Nazis, the 512th again distinguished itself by its fine work. V-E Day found us operating from a base in Germany east of the Rhine at Handorf, near Munster.



## IN PASSING

We would like to thank all the men who have in any way contributed toward making this book successful. Working against time and the handicaps of movement, everyone has come through in traditional fashion to complete the task in a very short time. We sincerely hope that in the years to come, passing through the pages will recall many amusing incidents of the days in England and on the Continent and bring to mind your many friends and buddies. Again many thanks, especially to those men below who have, in a special way, used their talents so effectively.

## DEDICATION

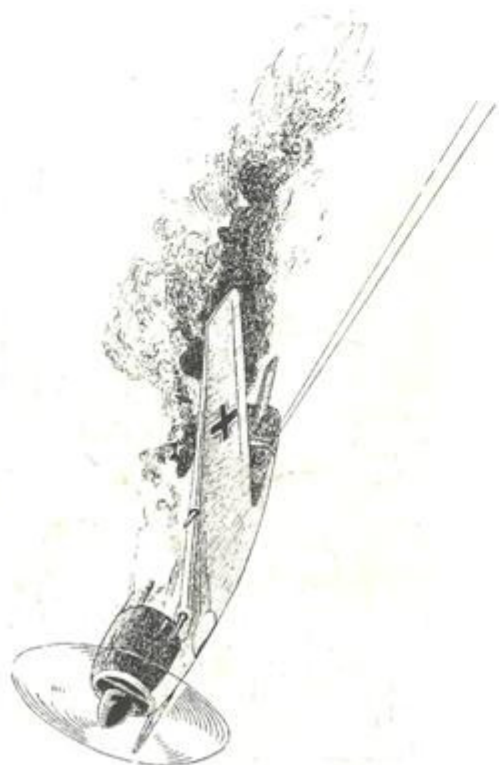
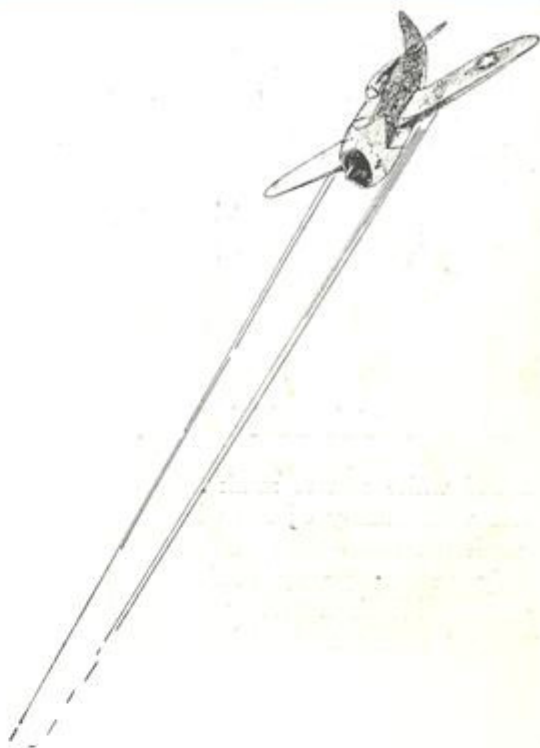

### Colonel GROSSETTA

Col. GROSSETTA, commanding officer of the 406th Ftr. Gp, received his commission in May 1939 and served as a Ftr. Pilot at Barksdale Field, La. and Moffett Field, Calif. At Hamilton Field, Calif., he became Flt. Comdr. He served in Alaska with the 11th. Ftr. Command as Ass't. Operations Officer where he attained the rank of Lt. Col.

He led a Ftr. Gp. at Ft. Myers, Fla., before he took command of the 406th Ftr. Bmb. Gp. in Nov 1943. He then trained the Gp. for overseas duty.

Col. Grossetta is a Sigma Chi alumnus of the Univ. of Arizona where he graduated in 1937.

He has received the senior pilot award for 5 years service in the A. A. F. and 1500 hrs. flying time. He has also received the « Croix de Guerre », « Distinguished Flying Cross », and the « Air Medal » with 11 clusters.





### Lt. Col. VINZANT

Lt. Col. VINZANT was from Porum, Oklahoma and attended Oklahoma A & M before entering the Army Air Forces in 1941. Col. Vinzant was an EM mechanic at Brooks Field, Texas, and Langley Field, Va., in 1940. He earned his wings in 1941 at Maxwell Field, Ala., and had a year of flying fighters in Iceland prior to his arrival in England.

Before taking command of the 512th Ftr. Sp. in March 1945, Col. Vinzant had previously held the post of Flt. Comdr. in the 389th Ftr. Sq., then Gp. Operations officer for the 366th Ftr. Gp. and then Ass't Director of Operations in the XXIX TAC. He received the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Croix de Guerre avec Etoile de Vermeil, and 15 Oak Leaf Clusters to his Air Medal during his 30 months overseas.



### Lt. Col. LOCKE

Lt. Col. LOCKE was commanding officer of the 512th Ftr. Sq. from the time the outfit trained at Congaree, S. C. until Asch, Belgium, at which time he was transferred to the XXIX TAC to assume duties as Assistant Director of Operations.

After graduating from high school he entered the regular army and after one year as a enlisted man he won a competitive appointment to West Point. After graduating from West Point he served for a period in the Field Artillery and then took up flying training.

Col. Locke won the confidence and respect of his men from the very beginning. He distinguished himself as leader of the squadron compiling 330 combat hours in 126 missions. He was awarded the Air Medal with 23 Oak Leaf Clusters, The Distinguished Flying Cross, Croix de Guerre avec Etoile de Vermeil, Purple Heart, and Distinctive Lead Crew Award.

Col. Locke is a native of San Antonio, Texas.

## LIFE IN THE SQUADRON



We have come a long way since the « Sterling Castle » docked at Liverpool, England and we entrained overnight to Ashford, Kent in Southern England in April 1944.

Our first homes were tents, the six man kind, into which seven were sandwiched. The outsides were decorated with fox holes which became popular with the introduction of the « doodle bugs ».

Day began with chow at 6.30 or earlier if missions were pre-scheduled and frequently ended long after dark. Then the lights came out to paint the skies and the night fighters took up their vigilance of the heavens.

Daily routines were much the same whether in the cow pastures of Southern England, the orchards of Normandy, France, or the village of Handorf, Germany.

Engineers took-off before many of us were awake, to pre-flight their ships. Long lines no matter what meal of the day, were a constant plague and we'd invariably find ourselves in one — if not to eat, then to get paid, draw something from supply, or have a gun inspected.

Numerous duties aside from the routine found men putting up tents, digging latrines, building huts in Belgium, policing the area, and in other ways converting pastures, orchards, and woods into small thriving communities.

Many times « Pup » tents were the vogue, then the « air echelon » would take off in quest of new fields. Bees attacked and counter-attacked the marmalade supply at Loupeland. « Andy » offered no end of amusement to all who had time to play with him and the addition of « Susie » at A-13 paid off with a litter at Handorf, with long black ears — how about that « Thunder »?

Movies played nightly and a USO show always proved to be cause for excitement. Even during the day the Red Cross occasionally put in a much welcomed appearance with coffee and doughnuts. The NAAFI in England also did a large crumpet and tea business.

Jackson Kyes and his band made a big hit at « the club » where things happened often 'till the wee hours of the morning.

And when daily duties were accomplished, many of us found friends and companionship in the neighboring villages and towns wherever we were stationed.

This was life in the squadron, which brought us together each day in a manner that produced an organization whose efficiency could not be challenged.

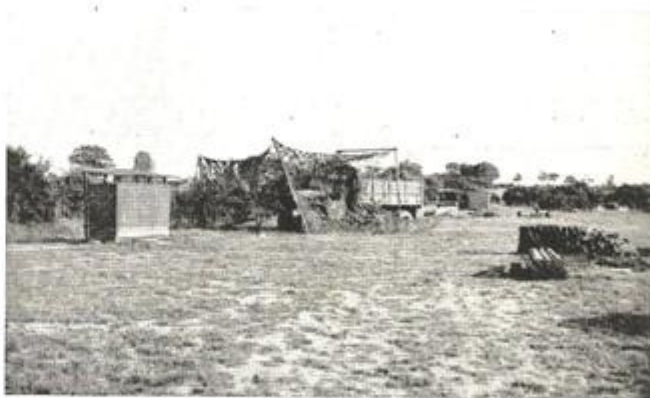

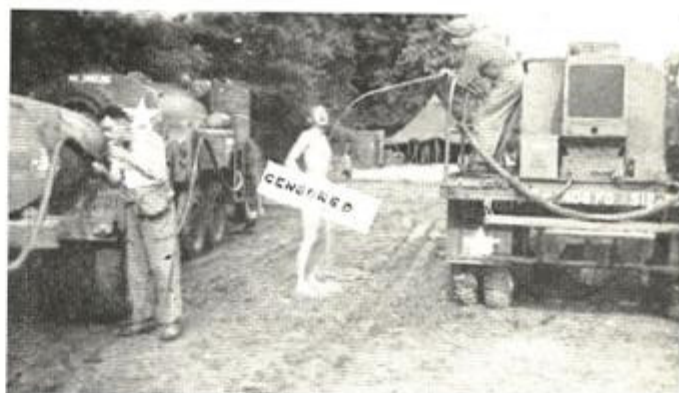

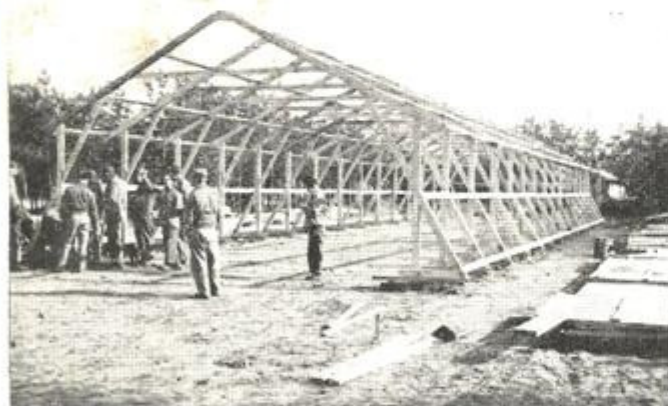

Yes — all these things have left their impression as well as the buddies with whom we performed our daily duties or cooked K rations over an open fire. But now we look back upon it all as just a pleasant memory — and we smile.
